

An update from the property committee:

- A small porch under construction over the western door of the Gallery between the vestry/heritage room and the new meeting room will protect the entrance from the weather.
- We are indebted to Richard Watson for keeping the lawns and hedge at the church in such great shape, free of charge. We also thank the CG Garden Club for replacing the lavender plants alongside the path into the church.
- We are currently finalising policies & procedures for the placement of Plaques on the Memorial Wall and the Interment of Ashes within the grounds of the Church. We hope to be ready to receive applications soon.
- The CG Garden Club was successful in receiving a grant from the City of Onkaparinga to install a sink heater in the kitchen. Ron Williamson has worked with them to facilitate and install this very useful convenience in our kitchen. Many thanks to the CG Garden Club and Ray Wise.
- There are several patches of rising damp on the walls inside the Church building that require
  attention. This will require replacing and installing a damp course. Quotes have been obtained and
  discussions with suitably qualified masons are ongoing. There is the possibility of applying for a
  heritage grant that will help defray the cost.
- The bell tower will be re-erected, probably during 2018. We have received an offer to weld additional steel onto the base of the legs so that the tower can be properly concreted onto a new base. We will also replace the timber supports for the bell.

Once the outside work has been completed on the church building we can then progress with upgrading the interior of the church. And with the completion of the works on the southern side of the church we will be able to finish work in the Remembrance Court area also.

On behalf of the other members of the Project Committee - and indeed the whole congregation - I would like to single out and again thank Alan Dubé, Ron Williamson and Jim Ward for their untiring and ongoing efforts.

We have also decided to change our church website due to changes being implemented by Synod. Check out the new website at the (web)address on the front of this newsletter.

# About Those Words



Arabella Katherine Hankey (or Kate as she was more usually known) was born on 12th January 1834 in Clapham, London. She grew up in a devout Anglican household and came to accept Jesus as her Saviour at a very early age. Along with her father, a prominent London banker, her whole family were active members of the Clapham Sect, a society that included influential businessmen and members of Parliament. The group was mostly known for its anti-slavery and pro-missionary stances. She became inspired by the Methodist revival of John Wesley and, while still a teenager, taught Sunday school for girls and then later travelled to South Africa where she worked as a nurse while helping her missionary brother. While recovering from a serious illness in 1866, she wrote the words, "Tell Me the Old, Old Story" on January 29th. It was originally a narrative poem of over 50 4-line verses.

In 1867, there was an international convention of the Y.M.C.A. in Montreal, Canada. Dr. William Howard Doane, a successful businessman from Chicago, (who was also an accomplished musician) attended this convention, as did Major General Russell, an English delegate and commander of the English forces in Ireland at the time, who had been invited to speak at the convention. Instead of the stirring speech he was planning to give, the General simply read Miss Hankey's poem - with great impact - at the convention. Doane was so impressed by the powerful words he had just heard that he wrote the music in a stage coach returning to his hotel. He joined two 4-line verses together to make one stanza and added the chorus that is now sung to the hymn. Miss Hankey did not approve of this arrangement; but when she saw how the hymn was being used by God to bring souls to Christ, she did not wish to hinder its usage.

> Tell me the old, old story of unseen things above, Of Jesus and His glory, of Jesus and His love. Tell me the story simply, as to a little child, For I am weak and weary, and helpless and defiled. Refrain
