The New Meeting Room A Project Committee Update by Alan Dubé

Floor Covering

The Project Committee has finished reviewing various options for the floor covering and has researched three alternative coverings - ceramic tiles broad loom carpet and carpet tiles. For a range of reasons including price, longevity, sound absorption and durability we have chosen carpet tiles. The carpet tiles we have chosen are stain resistant, low fire risk. solution dved (that is the colour does not wear off) and can be taken up, switched around, cleaned and replaced by spare tiles. They are made to resist impact wear such from castors etc and are guaranteed for 15 years against wear. The tiles are Eco modular and made in SA of recycled plastic bottles and are recyclable when worn out as well! Following our "buy local" philosophy we will purchase them from Choices Flooring, Blackwood,

We plan to install the same tiles in the Vestry/History Room and therefore will need urgent help to move items out of that room when the carpet laver is ready to lav the carpet tiles. Measurements have been taken and the final quote will be in soon.

About That Hymn



Beneath the Cross of Jesus

Beneath the cross of Jesus I fain would take my stand. the shadow of a mighty rock within a weary land. a home within the wilderness a rest upon the way. from the burning of the noontide heat. and the burden of the day.

The words for this wonderful old hvmn were written by Elizabeth Cecilia Douglas Clephane, a frail. Scottish Presbyterian woman who was born in 1830 in Edinburgh. Scotland, She wrote this beautiful hymn in 1868, when she was 38 and just a year before she died. One of just a few women hymn writers of Scotland, she grew up in Melrose, near Abbotsford. The youngest of three sisters her father was a county sheriff and her mother was a descendent of the famous Douglas family. Elizabeth suffered from poor health most of her life and was known as the delicate, retiring member of the family, but that didn't keep her from serving others. Within the failing limits of her own strength and health, she served the poor and sick of her community. and gave to charity all that she did not actually require for her daily needs. She regularly helped the poor and those with disabilities, even selling a horse and carriage to give more money. Despite her physical frailties. Elizabeth was well loved and known throughout her community for her helpful, cheery nature and selfless spirit. Her constant and unreserved love and care for others earned her the nickname. "The Little Sunbeam."

Elizabeth did not live to see her hymns (and poetry), which include "The Ninety and Nine" published, as this only happened about 3 years after her death.

Her life though, despite her poor health, was a life dedicated to giving and caring for others who were poor or with disability. She was a wonderful example of witness and puts a whole new meaning to the words of the old Sunday School song "Jesus Wants Me For a Sunbeam".

Just for the Record! It was 50 years ago Prim Dube created history! She was the second woman in South Australia to graduate with a degree in Agricultural Science. Well done and congratulations. Prim.
