Moved by the high number of British war casualties in such a short space of time, Binyon wrote the poem on a visit to Cornwall; it was published in "The Times" on 21st September 1914.

As we gather to remember this Anzac Day, may we be mindful of the words of Jesus in John's Gospel:

"Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends."

About Those Words

For the Fallen

Written on a cliff top overlooking the Cornish coast the poem "For the Fallen" is the outpouring emotion of English poet Laurence Binyon. Being too old to enlist for military service Binyon volunteered at a British hospital in France during the war where he cared for casualties of the conflict. Here he was to witness first hand the horrible truth of war and the ultimate sacrifice made by so many. The powerful words in verse 4, now known to many as "The Ode", have been used in commemorative services throughout the world since 1921.

As you read these beautiful words take a moment to quietly reflect on those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice.

With proud thanksgiving, a mother for her children, England mourns for her dead across the sea. Flesh of her flesh they were, spirit of her spirit, fallen in the cause of the free.

Solemn the drums thrill: Death august and royal sings sorrow up into immortal spheres.

There is music in the midst of desolation and a glory that shines upon our tears.

They went with songs to the battle, they were young, straight of limb, true of eye, steady and aglow. They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted, they fell with their faces to the foe.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:
Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun and in the morning
we will remember them.

They mingle not with their laughing comrades again;
They sit no more at familiar tables of home;
They have no lot in our labour of the day-time;
They sleep beyond England's foam.

But where our desires are and our hopes profound, felt as a well-spring that is hidden from sight, to the innermost heart of their own land they are known as the stars are known to the Night;

As the stars that shall be bright when we are dust, moving in marches upon the heavenly plain, as the stars that are starry in the time of our darkness, to the end, to the end, they remain.
