WE'RE GOING TO RIO!!

One of the discussion groups coined the acronym RIO:

- **R** = relationships are all important; good relationships, where people can be comfortable sharing with each other.
- I = invitation; people feel wanted and cared for if they receive a personal invitation to participate in an activity. This includes those who gather for worship on Sunday morning and other times - they also need to be continually invited.
- **O** = open; being open to the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives; being open to sharing the Gospel with the people where God has placed us.

We may never feel ready, but we are sent.

Psalm 96: 2-3; "Sing to the Lord, bless his name; tell of his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvellous works among all the peoples."

Our call is to tell the story, to testify, to invite people to come and see.

A Time for Reflection.



<u>About That Hymn</u>



I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Come unto Me and rest; Lay down, thou weary one, lay down Thy head upon My breast." I came to Jesus as I was, weary and worn and sad; I found in Him a resting place, and He has made me glad.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Behold, I freely give The living water; thirsty one, stoop down, and drink, and live." I came to Jesus, and I drank of that life giving stream; My thirst was quenched, my soul revived, and now I live in Him.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "I am this dark world's Light; Look unto Me, thy morn shall rise, and all thy day be bright." I looked to Jesus, and I found in Him my Star, my Sun; And in that light of life I'll walk, till travelling days are done.

The words of this favourite hymn, written by Horatius Bonar, are based on Matthew 11:28 "Come to Me, all you who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest"; John 4:14 "Behold I freely give the living water; thirsty one stoop down, and drink", and John 8:12 "I am the light of the world".

Horatius was born in Edinburgh, 19th December 1808, one of eleven children. He loved children and had a special skill in communicating with them. He and his wife, Jane, who he married in 1843, had 9 children, sadly losing five children of their own, so children were very special to him.

He became known as "The Prince of Scottish hymnists". He studied for the ministry at the University of Edinburgh, and served an internship at Leith. He was ordained in 1837 and began pastoring at the church at Kelso where he stayed for over 20 years. Throughout his life he had been strongly influenced by Thomas Chalmers (a highly regarded Scottish theologian & academic scholar), and in 1866 he was invited to become minister of the Chalmers Memorial Chapel in his home city of Edinburgh. He was to serve that church until the year before his death in 1889.

Only the Scottish version of hymns was sung at his church, and only the children were allowed to sing his hymns. The children always looked forward to his visits when he would lead them in singing.

He wrote the hymn "I heard the voice of Jesus say" especially for his Sunday School children. He based the three verses on three promises made by Jesus. The first half of each verse states the promise, and the last half of each verse is our response to the promise.

Many years later, one of his daughters was widowed and returned home to live with her parents. She had five young children. Many grandparents would groan at the added burden, but Bonar rejoiced and wrote to a friend, "God took five children from life some years ago, and He has given me another five to bring up for Him in my old age".

He was 80 when he preached his last sermon, and one of his last requests was that no one write a biography of his life. He wanted all the glory to be in Christ's name alone.
