What A Friend We Have In Jesus

What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear! What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer! O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear. All because we do not carry everything to God in prayer

Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged, take it to the Lord in prayer! Can we find a friend so faithful, who will all our sorrows share? Jesus knows our every weakness, take it to the Lord in prayer.

Are we weak and heavy laden, cumbered with a load of care? Precious Saviour, still our Refuge, take it to the Lord in prayer. Do thy friends despise, forsake thee? Take it to the Lord in prayer; In His arms He'll take and shield thee, Thou wilt find a solace there.

Many hymns or "Songs of Praise" can be used to teach scripture, and I'm sure this one would fall into that category. It is based on Philippians 4, verses 6-7, "The peace of God which surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

Behind the words of this favourite song is the faith of a Christian who experienced not one but a series of life-changing personal tragedies. In 1845 when Joseph Scriven was 25 years of age his fiancée accidently drowned in a lake the day before their planned wedding. This was the first of many misfortunes that led him to consecrate his life and property to Christ's service. He was so distressed that he decided to emigrate to escape his painful memories from his homeland in Ireland to Canada where he worked as a teacher.

Some 10 years later in 1855, his mother was experiencing a crisis in her own life. And, because Joseph could not go back home to Ireland to be with her, he wrote a poem called "What a friend we have in Jesus" and sent it to her in Ireland. A few years later Joseph experienced further tragedy when the girl he was about to marry in Canada contracted TB and died. He dedicated his life to his ministry - doing charity work and preaching.

Many years later, when Scriven himself was gravely ill, a friend who was sitting with him at his bedside read a poem from a manuscript. It was the poem that Joseph had written especially for his mother to comfort her in her time of need had written to his mother. Apparently his mother had passed the poem on to a friend, who published it without acknowledging the author.

So the origin and author of "What a friend we have in Jesus" was at last revealed.

Scriven said of the poem, that quickly became a well-loved hymn, "The Lord and I did it between us".

A remarkable man, who himself was faced with such adversity, has given so much support, care and understanding to so many through the simple words of his faith.
